#### **LOCAL ADMINISTRATIVE ORDER 2011 - 04**

#### STATE OF MICHIGAN THIRD JUDICIAL CIRCUIT

SUBJECT:

ESTABLISHMENT OF A SOLUTION ORIENTED DOMESTIC VIOLENCE PREVENTION COURT

This Administrative Order creates a Solution Oriented Domestic Violence Prevention Court in the Domestic Relations Section of the Family Division of the Third Judicial Circuit of Michigan, which will handle domestic relations cases that meet the established criteria set forth below. Accordingly,

#### IT IS ORDERED:

- 1. The Solution Oriented Domestic Violence Prevention Court will provide a comprehensive response to Domestic Relations cases in which there are:
  - a. Allegations of domestic abuse, power, and control issues;
  - b. Intimate partners or former intimate partners; and
  - c. A high risk of recurring violence, stalking, or lethality.
- 2. Cases handled by the Solution Oriented Domestic Violence Prevention Court may include, but are not limited to, the following issues:
  - a. Litigants with substance abuse problems;
  - b. Litigants with mental health concerns:
  - c. Litigants who have previously shown disregard for protective orders;
  - d. Allegations of sexual assaults or forced or coerced sexual contact:
  - e. Litigants who have allegedly used weapons to perpetuate the cycle of violence;
  - f. Litigants with ongoing litigation in criminal court or a past violent history.

The Solution Oriented Domestic Violence Prevention Court will collaborate with the Wayne County Friend of the Court, the Wayne County Prosecutor, the Wayne County Clerk, the Wayne County Sheriff, the 36th District Court of Michigan, the City of Detroit Police Department, the University of Detroit Mercy Law School, Wayne State University Law School, the Michigan Coalition Against Domestic and Sexual Violence, First Step, Batterers Intervention Service Coalition of Michigan, the Transition Center – Schoolcraft College, the Michigan Domestic Violence and Treatment Board, the Wayne County Counsel Against Family Violence, the Arab Community Center for Economic and Social Service, Latino Family Services, Latin Americans for Social and Economic Development, and Turning Point to better serve litigants in cases involving domestic violence. All the above mentioned entities have entered into a Memorandum of Understanding with the Third Judicial Circuit Court, which is attached.

# IX. Memorandum of Understanding

WHEREAS. the Third Circuit Court of Michigan (Wayne County), Third Circuit Court Family Division, Friend of the Court, Wayne County Prosecutor, Wayne County Clerk, Wayne County Sheriff, 36th District Court, City of Detroit Police, University of Detroit Mercy Law School, Wayne State University Law School, Michigan Coalition Against Domestic and Sexual Violence, First Step, Batterers Intervention Service Coalition of Michigan (BISC-MI), The Transition Center - Schoolcraft College, Michigan Domestic Violence and Treatment Board, Wayne County Counsel Against Family Violence, The Arab Community Center for Economic and Social Services (ACCESS), Latino Family Services, Latin Americans for Social and Economic Development (LA SED), Turning Point have come together to make an application for OVW FY 2010 – Court Training and Improvements Program, grant; and

WHEREAS, the partners listed below have agreed to enter into a collaborative agreement in which the Third Circuit Court of Michigan will be the lead agency and named applicant and the other agencies will be partners in this application; and

WHEREAS, the partners here in desire to enter into a Memorandum of Understanding setting forth the services to be provided by the collaborative; and

WHEREAS, the application prepared and approved by the collaborative through its partners is to be submitted to the Office on Violence Against Women on or before February 9, 2010;

# I) Description of Partner Agencies

# Third Circuit Court of Michigan (Wayne County)

The Third Circuit Court of Michigan is the largest circuit court in Michigan administrated by Chief Judge, Virgil C. Smith. The Court is comprised of 61 judges and three operating divisions which have jurisdiction over civil, criminal, and family matters arising in the County of Wayne.

# Third Circuit Court Family Division

Twelve Circuit Court Judges are assigned to the Family Division-Domestic Relations Section. Cases handled include divorce, paternity, personal protection, emancipation of minors, name changes parental waivers, and infectious disease matters. Each of these case types may include matters concerning custody, support, support, parenting time, property, and other issues. There were approximately 31,500 new cases filings in the Family Division-Domestic Relations Section in 2008. The Presiding Judge is Maria L. Oxholm.

## Friend of the Court

The Third Circuit Friend of the Court (FOC) is the largest in Michigan, with over 223,000 active domestic relations cases. The FOC is an adjunct of the Circuit Court, which has as its primary responsibilities investigating, reporting, and making recommendations to the Court on matters of custody, parenting time, and support of minor children; and providing mediation as an alternative method of dispute resolution. The Friend of the Court schedules training for indigent counsel certification for assignment to Felony Non-Support and Personal Protection Violation Hearings. The Office of the Friend of the Court is administered by Zenell Brown.

## Wayne County Prosecutor

The mission of the Wayne County Prosecutor's Office is to pursue justice, to safeguard the community by demanding accountability of those who commit crimes and to enhance the quality of life by changing the culture of violence. The **Domestic Violence Unit** prosecutes assaultive crimes arising from a domestic relationship and supports the Personal Protection Order Docket by providing a prosecutor, as provided by statute, to handle the show cause violation in the violation phase. The Wayne County Prosecutor is Kym L. Worthy.

# Wayne County Clerk - Court Services Division

The Wayne County Clerk is the Clerk of the Third Judicial Circuit Court. The Court Services Division accepts, reviews and processes Civil cases in excess of \$25,000, Criminal cases, Family and Divorce cases, and Juvenile cases. In addition, the Court Services Division also assists citizens in the preparation and execution of Personal Protection Orders. The Wayne County Clerk is Cathy M. Garrett.

# Wayne County Sheriff

The Courts Division is responsible for maintaining order in the court rooms of the 3rd Circuit Court (Civil & Criminal Divisions) and Wayne County Probate Court. This division has court transfer responsibilities, which involves taking prisoners from the Jail Divisions to the courts.

In addition to its responsibilities inside the courtrooms, the Sheriff's Office is now responsible for building perimeter and entry security at the two main county court buildings, the Frank Murphy Hall of Justice and the Coleman A. Young Municipal Center. The Courts Division also includes the Friend of the Court Enforcement Unit, Civil Process Unit and Deed Fraud Task Force. The Wayne County Sheriff is Benny Napoleon.

# 36th District Court

The 36th District Court processes over 500,000 cases each year; it is a court of limited jurisdiction. This court has original jurisdiction for the following actions occurring in the City of Detroit, Traffic and Ordinance Violations, Criminal Misdemeanor Cases, Preliminary Examinations for Felony Cases, Small Claims Suits, Civil Lawsuits (other than small claims) for amounts up to \$25,000.00, Real Estate Matters Involving Rent and Land Contract Disputes. The

36<sup>th</sup> District Court has developed a specialty domestic violence court under the direction of Ruth C. Carter.

The Domestic Violence Early Intervention Program (DVIP) is a program started in 1994 by the Court, to reduce domestic violence by educating defendants about domestic violence and its adverse effect on them and their families. The DVIP is held at the 36th District Court every Saturday, 52 weeks a year. As a condition of a defendant/batterers bond, attendance is mandatory. The Chief Judge of the 36<sup>th</sup> District Court is Marylin E. Atkins.

# City of Detroit Police Department - VAP

The City of Detroit Police Department administers the Victim's Assistance Program (VAP) is designed to address the needs of individuals, families and communities affected by Domestic Violence, also called "intimate partner abuse," refers to physical, sexual, psychological and economic abuse or control that takes place within an intimate relationship, including marriage. DOMESTIC VIOLENCE IS A CRIME! Individual and Group counseling and support is available. The Chief of Police is Warren C. Evans.

# University of Detroit Mercy Law School

The University of Detroit Mercy Law School (UDM), a Catholic university in the Jesuit and Mercy traditions, exists to provide excellent student-centered undergraduate and graduate education in an urban context. A UDM education seeks to integrate the intellectual, spiritual, ethical and social development of their students.

As an independent Catholic institution of higher education, the University of Detroit Mercy supports a mission focused on teaching and learning. However, another important facet of UDM's mission is service to others. Both the Jesuit and Mercy traditions, which guide the University, have emphasized community service as a vital aspect in the education and development of students. Through a comprehensive curriculum, students are challenged to develop their social, leadership and service responsibilities. UDM continually reaffirms this commitment to service as students; faculty and staff initiate and participate in community outreach activities to benefit Detroit area residents. The administrator of the Internship/Externship program is Professor Richard T. Krisciunas.

# Wayne State University Law School

Wayne State University Law School has educated and trained top attorneys, judges and leaders since 1927, and continues to enjoy a strong reputation for preparing its students to excel in law. Wayne Law graduates continue to pass the Michigan Bar Examination with impressive passage rates and, according to *The National Jurist*, earn average starting salaries higher than 60 percent of graduates from 156 law schools nationwide. Wayne State Law School offers several areas of community outreach offering indigent representation through local area clinics. The administrator of the Intern/Externship program is Professor David Moss.

# Michigan Coalition Against Domestic and Sexual Violence (MCADSV)

MCADSV is dedicated to the empowerment of all the state's survivors of domestic and sexual violence. Their mission is to develop and promote efforts aimed at the elimination of all domestic and sexual violence in Michigan.

In addition, MCADSV recently began the "Building the Safety Net Project." A foundation funded project focused on strengthening the capacity of direct service provider programs for victims of domestic and sexual violence in the City of Detroit. The Executive Policy Director is Kathy Hagenian.

#### First Step

Since 1978, First Step has been a change agent in reducing domestic violence and sexual assault in Wayne County. First Step's continuing effectiveness is due to widespread acceptance and support from the 35 communities that First Step serves.

First Step – Peaceful Families, Safe Communities – offers free service for domestic violence and assault, a 24 hour help line, 24 hour on-call assault response team, in-court victim advocacy, interim housing, safety planning, support groups, counseling, legal, court, financial, medical and housing information, transitional supportive housing, community organization, sexual assault awareness and education, in-service trainings on domestic violence, and sexual assault. The Director of First Step is Judy Ellis.

# Batterers Intervention Service Coalition of Michigan (BISC-MI)

The Batterer Intervention Services Coalition of Michigan (BISC-MI) was initiated in November 1996, bringing together the efforts of all six regions of Michigan to develop certification and credentialing standards for batterer intervention programs offered throughout the state of Michigan. THE BISC-MI partners with Michigan Coalition Against Domestic and Sexual Violence (MCADSV) for services. The Chair is David Garvin.

# The Transition Center - Schoolcraft College

The Transition Center at Schoolcraft College has the staff and resources to assist students and community members with a broad range of concerns with emphasis on education and re-entry into the work force. Services to community members in difficult situations, including domestic violence, are available and staff is available to provide resources and address specific concerns. Courses, pamphlets, brochures and articles on a variety of topics are provided at the center. The Director is Pat Smith.

# Michigan Domestic Violence and Treatment Board

The Michigan Domestic Violence Prevention and Treatment Board (MDVPTB) was established within the Michigan Family Independence Agency (now known as the Department of Human Services) in 1978 by state legislation that created a Governor-appointed Board responsible for focusing state activity on domestic violence. The Board administers state and federal funding for

domestic violence shelters and advocacy services, develops and recommends policy, and develops and provides technical assistance and training. The Chairman of the Board is Judge Amy Krause, The Executive Director is Debi Cain.

# Wayne County Counsel Against Family Violence

In 1992, the Wayne County Coordinating Council to Prevent Domestic Violence [WCCCPDV] held its first meeting. The Council, an official body whose agency members were appointed by the County Executive, accepted a mission to change the way domestic violence was handled in our County. Through an alliance of government, service providers, and community agencies, the Council members began to advocate for the development of a comprehensive, coordinated approach to reducing this crime.

In January of 1999, "The Wayne County Council Against Family Violence," (WCCAFV) in recognition of the various forms of violence that occur within families. Like Wayne County, communities across Michigan and the nation have found that the creation of effective councils involved in issues of prevention, education, and intervention in the area of family violence creates commitments from their leaders. It is our hope that this commitment, the reduction of family violence, will become an enduring aspect of our community's public policy. The Coordinator is Julie Boggs.

# The Arab Community Center for Economic and Social Services (ACCESS)

The Arab Community Center for Economic and Social Services (ACCESS) has been serving the community for over 35 years, and is proud to be one of the nation's premier Arab American organizations. Started by a group of volunteers in 1971 out of a storefront in Dearborn's impoverished south end, ACCESS was created to assist the Arab immigrant population adapt to life in America, seven locations throughout the metropolitan area.

The Domestic Violence Prevention program aims at changing social attitudes toward domestic violence, empowering individuals at risk for domestic violence, and decreasing the incidence of domestic violence in the Arab American community. The Program Coordinator is Joanna Ladki.

## Latino Family Services

Latino Family Services is a community agency, which provides and coordinates comprehensive human services to residents of Wayne County with particular emphasis on its Latino residents. These services enhance the quality of life for children, youth, adults, families and the developmentally disabled. Latino Family Services provides these services in a bilingual and culturally competent manner. The Interim Executive Director is Alfonso Bermea.

# Latin Americans for Social and Economic Development (LA SED)

Since its founding in 1969, LA SED has served over 400,000 individuals, most of who have been low-income and have limited English proficiency. LA SED assists people of all ages with a variety of bilingual services ranging from specific to general. LA SED's leadership efforts are realized through the development of programs addressing the issues that affect the diverse ethnic

groups living in our community. At LA SED, we view each individual as a person of worth and dignity entitled to every courtesy. We strive to be prompt, courteous and accurate in the performance of our duties. The Executive Director is Blanca E. Almanza.

## **Turning Point**

Turning Point has a long history of providing advocacy for domestic and sexual assault survivors, both locally and throughout the State of Michigan. The Executive Director was recognized in 1997 by the Michigan Coalition Against Domestic & Sexual Violence with the Apple Blossom Award for her outstanding efforts to end violence against women in Michigan. Turning Point's Director of Children Services won the Seedling Award for her efforts on behalf of children living in domestic violence shelters. In 2006, Turning Point received an award from the National Family Violence Prevention Fund for advocacy efforts on behalf of domestic violence victims in the child welfare system. The President and CEO is Suzanne Coats.

#### II) History of Relationship

The Third Circuit Court – Family Division recognized the need to expand the Personal Protection Order Docket and has already scheduled a meeting with listed proposed partners for February 16, 2010. With the announcement of the grant proposal, the court's efforts to contact proposed partners were accelerated with each partner being interviewed for commitment and interest in the project. Partnership development will continue throughout the planning and implementation portions of the program.

# III) Development of Application

Partners were targeted by the grant application committee and were based on judges and staff information regarding the partner's ability to contribute to the development and support of the new domestic violence court concept.

Each partner was interviewed for interest, ability to contribute to the program, and commitment to participating in the development team and implementation committee.

## IV) Roles and Responsibilities

NOW, THEREFORE, it is hereby agreed by and between the partners as follows:

- 1) The Third Circuit Court of Michigan (Wayne County) will provide to victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking the following:
  - Advisory oversight of SODVPC program
  - Oversight to ensure grant compliance
  - Judicial Family Division resources to support the program
  - Staff to attend training based on grant funding guidelines
  - Policy and Procedural guidelines
  - Technical Support
  - Facilities

- 2) *Third Circuit Court Family Division* will provide victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking the following:
  - Judicial resources including courtroom staff, clerks and other necessary staff to the program
  - Courtroom support hearing schedules
  - Judicial oversight and guidance to victims
  - Tracking of program activities
  - Statistical reporting
  - Implementation of new policies and procedures
  - Initial screening and review of petitioners
- 3) *Friend of the Court* will provide victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking the following:
  - Training for indigent counsel certification for personal protection violation hearings
- 4) Wayne County Prosecutor will provide victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalking the following:
  - Prosecution of assaultive crimes arising from a domestic relationship
  - Support the SODVPC docket in the violation phase
- 5) The Wayne County Clerk, Court Services Division will provide victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalking the following:
  - Accept, review and processes domestic violence PPOs
  - Assist in preparation and execution of PPOs
  - Courtroom clerk staff support
- 6) Wayne County Sheriff will provide victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalking the following:
  - Security and order in the SODVPC
  - Fulfillment of transfer responsibilities
  - Domestic violence education when serving PPOs
- 7) The 36<sup>th</sup> District Court, Domestic Violence Intervention Program (DVIP) will provide victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalking the following:
  - Expertise in batterer services
  - Batterer education regarding domestic violence and its adverse effects on victims
  - Coordinate statistics gathering for project impact

- 8) The City of Detroit Police Department, VAP will provide victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalking the following:
  - React to the needs of individuals, families and communities affected by domestic violence
  - Law enforcement domestic violence expertise
- 9) *University of Detroit Mercy Law School* will provide victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalking the following:
  - Extern law students
  - Legal community outreach and awareness
- 10) Wayne State University Law School will provide victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalking the following:
  - Extern law students
  - Legal community outreach and awareness
- 11) Michigan Coalition Against Domestic and Sexual Violence (MCADSV) will provide victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalking the following:
  - Domestic violence training for judges and court staff
  - Domestic violence subject matter expertise for the project
  - Serve on the advisory committee
  - Help with determining value added partners to SODVPC through MCADSV "Building the Safety Net Project." A foundation funded project focused on strengthening the capacity of direct service provider programs for victims of domestic and sexual violence in the City of Detroit
- 12) *First Step* will provide victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalking the following:
  - SODVPC judges, judicial staff and court support staff with domestic violence education
  - Services for domestic violence and assault including a 24 hour help line, 24 hour on-call
    assault response team, in-court victim advocacy, interim housing, safety planning,
    support groups, counseling, legal, court, financial, medical and housing information,
    transitional supportive housing, community organization, sexual assault awareness and
    education, in-service training on domestic violence and sexual assault.
- 13) Batterers Intervention Service Coalition of Michigan (BISC-MI) will provide victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalking the following:
  - SODVPC judges, judicial staff and court support staff with domestic violence education
  - Information regarding the certification and credentialing standards for batterer intervention programs

- 14) *The Transition Center Schoolcraft College* will provide victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalking the following:
  - Staff and resources to assist domestic violence victims through education and work reentry programs
  - Educational courses, pamphlets, brochures and articles for SODVPC victims
- 15) *Michigan Domestic Violence and Treatment Board* will provide victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalking the following:
  - Information to assist in locating state and federal funding sources for domestic violence services
  - Assistance in developing and recommending policy to SODVPC
  - Technical assistance and training
- 16) Wayne County Counsel Against Family Violence will provide victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalking the following:
  - Domestic violence education and training
  - Advocacy for a comprehensive, coordinated community approach to reducing domestic violence
- 17) The Arab Community Center for Economic and Social Services (ACCESS) will provide victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalking the following:
  - Arabic translators for Arabic speaking domestic violence victims
  - Communication, access and support to the Arab community
- 18) Latino Family Services will provide victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalking the following:
  - Spanish translators for Spanish speaking domestic violence victims
  - Communication, access and support to the Latino community
- 19) Latin Americans for Social and Economic Development (LA SED) will provide victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalking the following:
  - Spanish translators for Spanish speaking domestic violence victims
  - Communication, access, and support to the Latino community
- 20) *Turning Point* will provide victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalking the following:
  - Provide SODVPC with domestic violence education and training
  - Provide advocacy services for domestic violence victims
